RECTOR'S REFLECTIONS:

Sharing our Harvest



Each year we set aside a Sunday in October for the celebration of our *Harvest Festival*. That is an annual occasion when we offer our thanksgiving for the bounty of this fertile land in which we are blessed to live. Produce, both fresh fruit and vegetables grown on local farms, and tinned items bought in local shops, beautifully decorate our churches in Cruden Bay and in Ellon. Visual evidence of the agricultural abundance that so generously is offered for display on that festive occasion is provided in the two photographs showing food goods arranged in front of the altar at Saint James-the-Less and at the font in Saint Mary-on-the-Rock.

But all that food is not brought into our two churches merely for the adornment and decoration of the buildings. The Collect used every year when we celebrate the harvest reminds us of a very important mission task given to each one of us when we pray these words: "God, you crown the year with your goodness and give us the fruits of the earth in their season: grant that we may use them to your glory so that none may hunger." Autumn's harvest, always so artistically arranged by a group of volunteers, certainly makes our churches look especially festive and even more beautiful. But all these items are being brought to Saint James and to Saint Mary's so that we can fulfil the mandate given to us in that Harvest Collect when we commit ourselves to "use them to God's glory so that none may hunger."

At our *Harvest Festival*, which this year falls on Sunday, 13th October, we collect all manner and sorts of edible (and hygiene) goods for the two Food Banks that serve this area of Aberdeenshire. Once we have finished our festive celebrations, those items are bagged and boxed up for delivery to the *Ellon Food Bank* and the *Peterhead Food Bank*: both of which are branches of the 'Aberdeenshire North Food Banks' run by the *Trussell Trust*. In this way, Harvest Thanksgiving is an integral part of our stewardship because we are called by Christ to care for the poor, the hungry, and those in need. As we have done in previous years, let us continue to act compassionately towards all those who are in need: sharing with those persons who have very little from the bountiful abundance with which we are so richly blessed.





> Sunday 3rd November.

ALL boxes/bags from both churches will be collected from Saint Mary's during the first week of November. For those at Saint Mary's who are unable to get to the church, the box/bag can be picked up from your home – call me on 01358-721197 or email melric2@btinternet.com for further details, or to arrange pickup.

If you have difficulty in finding empty shoeboxes, please use a **drawstring bag** instead (like a school shoe bag). The maximum size should be 40cm x 30cm (16ins x 12ins) which can hold as much as an average sized shoebox. It is requested that the bag is not plastic as the bag itself is a useful item to give to people. These can be handmade or sourced cheaply online.

In the past, we have received generous contributions of items from the list which can then be made up into boxes, this is a great way to be involved in the appeal if you find time is short! Just add a few items into your weekly shopping and pass them in – thank you to those who have already done this! It's a great help.

On Friday evening, 13th September, Cruden Bay's Church of Saint James-the-Less hosted a Community Café and Concert. This event was supported by a grant from the Recovery & Renewal Fund that was established following the Coronavirus Pandemic to help congregations reach out and engage with their local communities after the enforced isolation and separation caused by the restrictions implemented due to Covid-19. Previously, Saint James has hosted several Community Cafés with these grant funds. But this time we wanted to reach a larger audience, so we added a concert to draw in more people. Vocalists and instrumentalists from the Cruden Bay Folk Club performed a marvellous concert. On that mid-September evening, 59 people came together inside Saint James's Church for a convivial time After an hour of music, refreshments of sandwiches and of entertainment. traybakes were served at the interval. Then the concert resumed with a further hour of music. It was great seeing quite a few new faces in Saint James. For some people it was their very first time inside the church, and it was a pleasure to welcome them into a place which we hope might one day become a spiritual home for some of them.


- Fr Dennis explains that: if there are six cakes cut into eight squares then he shall have to eat this much; now that's math for you!
